

NEW AND CONTINUING CASES

BAHRAIN

Scholars and Researchers: Endangered Scholars Worldwide is gravely concerned about the decision issued on May 14, 2015, by the Bahraini court to deport Professor MASAUD MIRZA JAFFAR JAHROMI, who had his citizenship revoked on January 31, 2015, along with 70 other people.

Professor Jahromi does not have a second nationality. The decision to revoke his passport in January 2015 was based on an order from the minister of the interior, and allegations of "damage to the interests of the country and loyalty to the king." The court issued an order for his deportation and a fine of 100 dinars. Professor Jahromi holds a PhD in Telecommunication Networking from the University of Kent at Canterbury in the United Kingdom, and he was the Chairman of the Telecommunication Engineering Department at Ahlia University. In 2011, Jahromi was imprisoned for five months.

Previously featured scholars from Bahrain who remain in prison include prisoner of conscience MAHDI 'ISSA MAHDI ABU DHEEB, former president of the Bahrain Teachers' Association, sentenced to five years' imprisonment on September 21, 2012, on charges of "inciting hatred against the regime" and "attempting to overthrow and change the regime by force," and DR. ABDUL-JALIL AL-SINGACE, head of the department of engineering at the University of Bahrain, sentenced to life in prison by the military National Safety Court on charges of "plotting to topple" the government in June 2011. As of this report, Professor Al-Singace's family confirmed that he has been denied medical attention and family visits again. Endangered Scholars Worldwide emphasizes that denying prisoners' medical care and treatment is considered a breach of international conventions and national laws, regardless of the crime.

Students: Previously featured students from Bahrain who remain in prison include AHMAD JASSAN ALI MSHAIMA', arrested on December 28, 2013, and charged on April 16, 2014, with "illegal gathering with an intent to commit crimes and disturb public security" following protests to mark the second anniversary of the uprising on February 14, 2013. AHMED AL ARAB, 22, a nursing student from Bani Jamra, was arrested on January 9, 2014, in Hamad Town and reportedly was severely tortured in extracting a confession. As of this report, his health condition remains critical. Also still imprisoned are AHMED AOUN, arrested by authorities when he sought treatment at a hospital following an eye injury inflicted by police during protests on May 13, 2012, and six students, arrested on March 5, 2012, as part of a crackdown on student involvement in pro-democracy demonstrations: JAWAD AL-MAHARY, SHAWQI RADHI, JASSIM AL-MUKHODHER, YOUSIF AHMED, and JASSIM AL HULAIBI, the latter of whom remains in prison despite the fact that he has served his full sentence. According to the Bahrain Youth Center in Al-Wafaq, all of these students have been severely tortured in order to extract confessions.

BURMA (MYANMAR)

Al-Manama

Students: On March 10, 2015, riot police arrested 127 people, including 70 students, for joining protests against the proposed National Education Law, which is believed to have given the government excessive power in managing the country's higher education institutions. Although Myanmar government spokesman Ye Htut told the Global New Light of Myanmar newspaper that most students have been released from the jail, according to a report published on June 2, 2015, at least five student leaders remain in prison as of this report: EI THINZAR MAUNG, a student leader from Mandalay, PO PO, a 20-year old, EMIN THWAY THIT, 22, from All Burma Federation of Student Unions, PHYO PHYO AUNG, 27, and HONEY OO, 27. As of this report, their condition remains unknown.

CAMEROON

Scholars and researchers: A previously featured scholar, ENOH MEYOMESSE, remains in prison. Meyomesse, 58, a writer, political activist, historian, blogger, and founder and president of the Cameroon Writers Association, was sentenced on December 27, 2012, to seven years' imprisonment on charges of illegally trafficking gold. No witnesses or evidence were presented during the trial, and he was not allowed to testify in his own defense. Meyomesse is a recipient of the 2012 Oxfam Novib/PEN Award in recognition of his continued work in the face of persecution. As of this report, his situation remains critical.

CHINA

Scholars and researchers: ILHAM TOHTI, an economics professor and distinguished scholar of China's Uyghur Muslim minority, received a life sentence on Sept. 23, 2014, for "separatism" by a court in northwestern China's troubled Xinjiang region, as well as deprivation of his political rights and confiscation of all his assets. Tohti's wife, in an interview with the Radio Free Europe on May 22, 2015, stated that the Chinese authorities have denied the relatives of the jailed Uyghur scholar permission to visit him or send him clothing and money in prison. Both Scholars at Risk and Endangered Scholars Worldwide are gravely concerned about the ongoing unfair treatment of this prominent scholar.

GUO YUSHAN, a founder of the Transition Institute, a think tank that researches business regulations, reform, and civil society, was detained on October 9, 2014, on the charge of "causing a disturbance." Guo was involved in helping the blind dissident Chen Guangcheng flee to the United States in 2012.

A number of scholars featured in previous issues remain in prison, including ZHU JIANRONG, a Chinese scholar, who has been held incommunicado by Chinese authorities since mid-July 2013. He went missing at that time while on a trip to Shanghai, and was unable to communicate with family until more than three months later, when his brother in Shanghai received a letter written by Zhu. The letter confirms only that he is being detained by Chinese authorities and does not specify when he will be released. Prior to his disappearance, Zhu had been engaged in a research project involving interviews with officials of the Chinese military.

Also still imprisoned are writer and editor TASHI RABTEN (pen name Te'urang), sentenced to four years' imprisonment on June 2, 2011, for his critical political writings; Guo QUAN, a former literature professor at Nanjing Normal University, sentenced to 10 years in prison and 3 years of deprivation of political rights in October 2009 on charges of "inciting subversion of state power"; and ши хілово, a Nobel Peace Prize laureate and Social Research author, held in Jinzhou Prison since his arrest in December 2008 for "inciting subversion of state power."

Students: Previously featured students who were sentenced on December 8, 2014, by Chinese criminal court for anywhere from three to eight years remain in prison on the accusation of separatism in relation with Professor Ilham Tohti. These students were arrested in January 2014 along with Professor Tohti, PERHAT HALMURAT, SHOHRET NIJAT and LUO YUWEI had confessed on state television that they were instructed by Tohti to run articles that could stir ethnic tensions. The other four students are mutellip imin, abduqeyum ablimit, atikem rozi and AKBAR IMIN. All the students except Luo are Uyghurian. As of this report, their condition is unknown.

A previously featured student, WANGCHUK DORJE, a Tibetan student leader at the Middle School of Humanities in Rebkong County, remains in prison. He was sentenced in June 2013 to four years in prison for his alleged role in organizing student protests.

EGYPT

Scholars and Researchers: On May 19, 2015, an Egyptian court sentenced the ousted Egyptian President Mohammed Morsi to death. The ruling also applies to another 106 people, among them the editor-in-chief of the Oxford Encyclopedia of Islam and professor of political science EMAD SHAHIN. Professor Shahin was sentenced in absentia to death in a case where he was accused of colluding with Iran and the Palestinian group Hamas to destabilize Egypt. He currently lives in the US and is a visiting professor at Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service. Both Endangered Scholars Worldwide and Amnesty International are gravely concerned by yet another mass death sentence handed down by an Egyptian court to more than 100 defendants, including Professor Emad Shahin.

AMR HAMZAWY, a professor at the American University in Cairo, also still in prison, has been charged with "insulting the judiciary" for a Tweet criticizing a court ruling. Hamzawy has played a prominent political role in the past three years, winning a seat in parliament and leading a liberal party.

Students: SHERIF GABER, 22, a student from Suez Canal University, was given a one-year prison sentence by an Egyptian court on February 17, 2015, for contempt of religion relating to activities on campus and atheistic statements online. Despite not being explicitly illegal, the new Egyptian government and judicial system has recently upheld the role of religion in the country after the military coup d'état by using a set of three new penal codes that include the charges of contempt of heavenly religions, desecrating religious symbols, and mocking religious rites in public. Each can carry a sentence of up to five years in prison. Based on these new penal codes, on January 25, 2015, student KARIM AL-BANNA was given a three-year prison sentence on charges of contempt of religion and insulting the divine.

ETHIOPIA

Scholars and Researchers: Previously featured scholars and researchers who remain in prison in Ethiopia include ABRAHA DESTA, a political science lecturer at Mekelle University, who was arrested on July 8, 2014, and detained in connection with his involvement with the legally registered Arena Tigray Party. He has been held incommunicado since then. As of this report, his whereabouts and health condition remain unknown.

Also still in prison are ZELALEM KIBRET, a professor of law at Ambo University, and BEFIKADU HAILU, a former lecturer and current staff member at St. Mary's University College, who was arrested along with members of the Zone 9 bloggers, ABEL WABELA, ATNAF BERAHANE, MAHLET FANTAHUN, BEFEQADU HAILU, NATNAEL FELEKE, ASMAMAW HAILEGEORGIS, TESFALEM WALDYES and EDOM KASSAYE. All were detained on April 26, 2014. "Zone 9" symbolizes the invisible prison that surrounds Ethiopians, implying that all citizens could be arrested at any time for exercising their right to free expression. The blog's mission is to cover harassment, threats, surveillance, and intimidation by the Ethiopian government. Kibret was arrested on the Ambo University campus, and intelligence forces seized computers and books from his office and home. Kibret, Hailu, and all of the bloggers are reportedly charged with inciting violence through social media and spreading instability in Ethiopia. The scholars are being held incommunicado at Makelawi prison with no access to legal representation, and officials have not permitted family members to visit the prisoners. All are at risk of torture and need your support.

Students: Manyazewal eshetu, a previously featured student at Addis Ababa University, who was accused of criminal defamation for allegedly posting criticism of university and city officials for corruption on his Facebook page, remains in prison. Police apprehended him on campus and he remains held without charge. As of this report, his condition remains unknown.

IRAN

Scholars and Researchers: Previously featured scholars from Iran who remain in prison include SAEED MADANI, a sociologist and member of the Nationalist-Religious Front, sentenced on June 21, 2013 to six years in prison and ten years in exile; ARZHANG DAVOODI, a poet, teacher, and cofounder of the pro-Western Confederation for Iranian Students, imprisoned since October 2003; MASOUD SEPEHR, a political science lecturer at Shiraz Azad University, detained without charge since his arrest on November 17, 2011; seven people connected to the Baha'i Institute for Higher Education, arrested following coordinated attacks on the institute in May 2011, including KAMRAN MORTEZAIE and VAHID MAHMOUDI, each sentenced to five years, and RAMIN ZIBAIE, MAHMOUD BADA-VAM, FARHAD SEDGHI, RIAZ SOBHANI, and NOUSHIN KHADEM, each sentenced to four years. Two cultural figures were also arrested, educator FARHAD VAKILINIA, serving three years, NAEEM NAJAFI, a student, serving four years, both charged with "acting against national security" by supporting Kurdish opposition groups in August 2011, as was DR. MOSTAFA ALAVI, an Iranian doctor and researcher sentenced to fifteen years in August 2008 for "plotting against the regime." ABDOLREZA GHANBARI, a university lecturer of Persian literature, arrested following the 2009 presidential election protests, was initially sentenced to death. His sentence was reduced in June 2013 to fifteen years' imprisonment and exile to the south of Iran by the court of appeal. All of these scholars are at risk of torture and need your support.

Students: We have previously featured OMID KOKABEE, a PhD student in physics, who was sentenced to six years' imprisonment in July 2012 on charges of communicating with a hostile government and taking illegal earnings, apparently on the basis of his scholarship funding. He remains in prison despite the fact that the Iranian Supreme Court recently reviewed his case and issued a ruling stating that there was no evidence of wrongdoing by Kokabee, and no evidence in the case to substantiate the charges and conviction. Reports indicate that his health condition remains critical.

Other previously featured students who remain in prison include VAHID RANJBAR, a member of the students union from the University of Sistan and Baluchistan, arrested in his home on August 12, 2014. He is suffering from a peptic ulcer. MASOUMEH GHOLIZADEH, a former student activist and student in Turkey, was arrested on May 23, 2014, shortly after his return to Tehran for a family visit. According to her family, she is suffering from heart failure and needs regular medical supervision. MARYAM SHAFIPOUR, 29, was sentenced to seven years in prison on March 1, 2014, on charges of "propaganda against the regime" and "assembly and collusion against national security." HAMID BABAEI, a PhD student at the University of Liege in Belgium, was arrested by the ministry of intelligence in August 2013 shortly after his return to Tehran for a family visit. After four months in detention, including three weeks of solitary confinement, Babaei was sentenced to six years in prison on December 21, 2013, for allegedly acting against national security by "communicating with hostile foreign governments and spying."

Additional Iranian students who remain in prison include ASHKAN ZAHABIAN, a student activist arrested on May 27, 2013, who is serving an eight-month sentence on charges of "acting against national secu-

rity," "spreading propaganda against the system," and "forming an illegal group with intention of harming national security"; soroush sabet, serving a two-year sentence since September 2012 in connection with his involvement in protests in 2007; LEVA KHANJANI, a member of the persecuted Baha'i religious minority, banned from receiving further education and serving a two-year sentence in connection with her involvement in protests in 2009; sayed ZIAODDIN (ZIA) NABAVI, serving a ten-year sentence after attending protests following the 2009 elections and currently in critical condition; and MAJID TAVAKOLI and BAHAREH HEDAYAT, distinguished student activists sentenced to eight-and-a-half and nine-and-a-half years, respectively, for their involvement in antigovernment protests in 2009. HEDAYAT is in critical condition. All are at risk of torture and need your support.

Students: Student protestors THONGPASEUTH KEUAKOUN, SENG-ALOUN PHENG-PHANH, and BOUAVANH CHANHMANIVONG remain in prison following their arrest on charges of treason in 1999 for displaying posters calling for economic, political, and social change during demonstrations. Even after fifteen years, it is not known in which prison the three students are being held or if they are still alive.

Scholars and Researchers: A previously featured scholar, ROLMAAJIDIIN TSENGEL, a southern Mongolian historian and translator, remains in prison. He was arrested on May 6, 2012, on charges of "attempting to overthrow the government of Mongolia and conspiracy of a coup." Tsengel is currently being held in the Mongolian capital Ulan Bator's Pre-trial Detention Center No. 461. He has been subject to torture during his detention and banned from having visitors or legal representatives.

Scholars and Researchers: Previously featured scholars from Russia who remain in prison are svyatoslav Bobyshev and Yevgeny Afanasyev, both professors at Baltic State Technical University in St. Petersburg, who were sentenced at a closed trial in June 2012 to 12 years in prison on charges of espionage and passing secret information to the Chinese government.

Scholars and Researchers: Previously featured scholars from Saudi Arabia who remain in prison include **DR**. ABDUL KAREEM YOUSEF AL-KHODR, a professor of comparative jurisprudence at Qassim University, sentenced on June 24, 2013, to eight years' imprisonment and a ten-year travel ban;

DR. SA'UD MUKHTAR AL-HASHIMI, a medical doctor and faculty member at the King Abdulaziz University sentenced on November 2011 to thirty years in prison, which is to be followed by a thirty-year travel ban; DR. YUSUF AL-AHMAD, an Islamic scholar who teaches at Imam Muhammad bin Sa'ud University in Riyadh, arrested after posting a YouTube video critical of long-term detentions of security suspects without due juridical process, sentenced to five years' imprisonment and a five-year travel ban on April 11, 2012; NADHIR AL-MAJID, a teacher and writer, detained on April 17, 2011, soon after the appearance of an article in which he criticized the Saudi government; and university professors sa'un AL-DUGHAITHIR, MUHAMMAD BIN NASIR AL-GHAMIDI, and ABD AL-KARIM AL-KHADHAR, all members of a group of nine intellectuals who drafted a party proposal seeking to create what would have been the first political party in Saudi Arabia, arrested on February 16, 2011. All are at risk of torture and need your support.

Scholars and Researchers: Scholars from Syria who remain in prison include MAHMOUD BAHBOUH, a university professor who was arrested in June 2013 by Syrian authorities and has been incommunicado since his arrest. As of the date of this report, his location and condition remains unknown. Bahbouh was a professor of chemistry at Al'baath University. ABDULRAHMAN ALKHATEB has been imprisoned since September 28, 2013. He was the head of the Syrian Arab Crescent Branch in Talbisah, Homs and the chair of the civil engineering department at Al'Baath University.

Students: ANAS SHUGHRI, a third-year economics student, remains in prison without any specific charge. The crisis in Syria continues to have a devastating impact on professors, researchers, students and the whole system of higher education in Syria. According to "The War Follows Them: Syrian University Students and Scholars in Lebanon," published by the Institute of International Education and the University of California Davis' Human Rights Initiative, as of June 2014, scores of students in rising numbers have fled Syrian universities and are living

in refugee camps in Jordan and Lebanon. Since conflicts began in March 2011, universities have been targeted in retribution for student and faculty participation in protests. In the past year, universities in Aleppo and Damascus have been bombed, killing students and destroying university classrooms, dormitories, and labs (as reported in our previous features). The Syria Consortium for Higher Education in Crisis, a program led by the Institute of International Education, is bringing together universities throughout the world to establish scholarships for displaced Syrian students. THAILAND

On February 27, 2014, two individuals, a student and an activist, were charged in Thai criminal courts with insulting the monarchy for staging a play called *The Wolf Bride* at Thammasat University back in 2013. PATIWAT SARAIYAEM, 23, a student at Khon Kaen University's Fine and Applied Arts Faculty, acted in the play, while activist PORNTHIP MANKONG, 26, coordinated the production. The play, which is about a fictional monarchy, was staged as part of Thammasat University's commemoration of the fortieth anniversary of pro-democracy student demonstrations that occurred in October 1973. The two were convicted on one count of Thailand's strict *lese majeste* laws, which protect the royals from any insults.

Students: Previously featured students who remain in prison in Vietnam include DINH NGUYEN KHA and NGUYEN PHUONG UYEN, sentenced to eight and six years in prison, respectively, on charges of "conducting propaganda against the state" at a trial in May 2013. The two were arrested in October 2012 for handing out leaflets critical of the government.
